

HOW TO CITE, USING THE 6TH ED. APA FORM, MATERIAL FROM <u>SELECTED REFERENCE</u> <u>RESOURCES</u> AT THE MOORPARK COLLEGE LIBRARY

In order to cite a source, begin the citation with the name of the person who wrote the material you are using.

Here are some examples of suggested methods of citation you may want to use in your References page.

An Encyclopedia:

An article that has the author's signature at the end:

Gavril, P. (2001). Heroin. In R. Carson-DeWitt (Ed.), Encyclopedia of drugs, alcohol and addictive

behavior (2nd ed., Vol. 2, pp. 594-596). New York: Macmillan.

An article that has no author indicated:

Beatles. (1998). In C. Larkin (Ed.), Encyclopedia of popular music (3rd ed., Vol. 1, pp. 432-437).

New York: Muze.

Opposing Viewpoints:

Regan, T. (2001). Animals have rights. In H. Cothran (Ed.), Animal experimentation: Opposing viewpoints (pp. 20-24). San Diego: Greenhaven.
