ASMC Programming Committee | 2019-2020 Funding Distributions

The Associated Students of Moorpark College (ASMC) continued to promote campus life by sponsoring several events, activities, programs, and services throughout the year. ASMC was able to provide support for clubs' meetings, campus-wide events, and/or student travel and trainings throughout the nation while remaining within its projected budgets and maintaining financial stability and positive balances in all of its accounts. Financial support was provided from a variety of revenue streams, including: ASMC student ID card sales; Student Activity Fees; Student Representation Fees; and gifted funds from the MC Barnes + Noble Bookstore.

In total, **ASMC distributed almost \$81,927 to 39 different campus organizations or departments from 2019 to 2020.** Over 35 clubs and organizations received financial support from ASMC during the last academic year, including the following:
