 - a. Head, spine, bone, and joint.
- 2. (70%) Health lifestyles and safety measures.
 - a. People with special needs: bandaging, splinting, immobilization, and rescue techniques.
 - b. Poisoning: basic, food, bites, and stings.
 - c. Wounds and infections: identification, prevention, and treatment.
 - d. Bleeding, shock, and anaphylaxis.
 - e. Basic life support procedures; artificial ventilation, blocked airway, choking, Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR), and Automated External Defibrillator (AED).
 - f. Legal aspects of first aid.
 - g. Sudden illness situations: heart problems, stroke, diabetic, asthma, seizures.
 - h. Burns: thermal, chemical, electrical, and radiation.
 - i. Head, chest, and abdominal injuries.
 - j. Body systems Emergency action procedures and victim assessment.

- 2. First aid scenarios demonstration requiring a written report. Student must analyze factors such as: scene safety, type of emergency, and/or number of victims to determine what action is warranted.

Critical Thinking Assignments

- 1. Evaluation of emergency scenarios in which students must analyze site safety, type of emergency, injuries, resources available, treatment required, and demonstrate care given.
- 2. Development of a home first aid kit and home emergency and safety plans which reflect their family's needs and lifestyle.
- 3. Assessment of life support problems, development of an emergency action plan, and demonstration of procedures.

- 2. Assigned reading from online resources.

- 1. Live demonstration of practical skills such as CPR and Severe Airway Obstruction for adult, child, and infant, bandaging and splinting practical.
