


A MONTH OF DIVERSITY & CELEBRATION

CAMPUS-WIDE SOCIAL JUSTICE CONTINUES AT MC

CALIFORNIA COMMUNITY COLLEGE RACIAL EQUITY LEADERSHIP ALLIANCE MONTHLY eCONVENING SERIES

Moorpark College has signed up for an ongoing webinar series that occurs each month for 3 hours. Each workshop style webinar is attended by 5 MC employees. On October 12, 2020, the workshop theme was *Understanding and Addressing Implicit Bias*. MC attendees were Professors Patricia Colman and Brandon Elliott, Dean Priscilla Mora, Marketing Coordinator Dina Pielae, and Classified Senate President Linda Resendiz. Hosted by the USC Race & Equity Center, the presenter was Dr. Julie Posselt, School of Education, USC. Three key takeaways were:

- *Implicit bias is subconscious, so people are not aware when they are applying it.*
- *Biases are visible more often in times when core needs are not met such as hunger, tiredness, and stress.*
- *We can't totally get rid of our biases but we can build our awareness and intentionally recognize what triggers an automated response. Recognition of implicit bias is a form of mindfulness.*

The workshop also covered Hiring and Retention Practices as well as Responses to Students. An observation made by the MC group is that it can be hard for members of a dominant group to recognize when bias is present because they are not experiencing the bias. Those who experience bias recognize it more immediately because it is part of their own experience.

- RECOMMENDED ACTION ITEMS
- Add training about implicit bias during future flex sessions.
This may include introduction of the Harvard Implicit Association Test.
 - Integrate reminders about implicit bias into all hiring committee orientations.
 - Consider a system to make applications "blind."
 - Use rubrics for assessment of applications.

STUDENTS THRIVE THROUGH ONLINE TUTORING

Moorpark College Teaching and Learning Center offers three dynamic free tutoring programs for our students: Course Embedded Tutors, The Math and Science Center, and the Writing Center.

COURSE EMBEDDED TUTORS

Course Embedded Tutors (CETs) are highly skilled tutors placed in a specific course who work directly with faculty to serve as in-class support for students. The CET attends lecture, takes notes, assists with group work, and provides weekly break-out sessions to provide further clarification of concepts and quiz/test reviews. CETs are located in 35 MC courses serving approximately 1200 students in Math, Engineering and Computer Science. Of the 1200 students, 135 have regularly attended the weekly review sessions in Fall 2020!




MATH AND SCIENCE CENTER

The Math and Science Center offers drop-in tutoring via Zoom Mondays-Thursday and on Saturday! Tutoring is offered for 33 specific courses in 8 academic disciplines. To date, 1,340 students have visited our Center in Fall 2020!

THE WRITING CENTER

Through dedicated appointments offered Monday-Saturday, the Writing Center consultants help students improve writing skills for courses across the curriculum (ex. English, Philosophy, Science, History, etc.), as well as for personal development or higher educational goals (ex. transfer/admission essays). In Fall 2020, 654 individual consults have occurred!

In addition to the personalized Moorpark College tutoring, MC students have benefited from NetTutor, our 24 hour/7 days a week after-hours tutoring service. CASH4COLLEGE

MC Financial Aid Registered many students during the recent Saturday events. They are now offering weekly Zoom student workshops every Tuesday from 4-6PM. MC/FA takes students through a step-by-step process on how to get the money they need for tuition, textbooks and living expenses. MC/FA Officer, Kim Korinke also held a virtual webinar during the MC Student Health Virtual Fair about Financial Health.



STUDENT SUPPORT FOCUSES ON STUDENT SUCCESS

MC DUAL ENROLLMENT

Moorpark College Dual Enrollment office has submitted 30 requests for classes to be held this upcoming spring 2021 term. This is 3 more classes than the current fall 2020 term, an 11% increase from one term to the next.

The office is seeking information from the MC information technology department and the State Chancellors office to coordinate two more classes at the youth correctional facility. If successful, the total number of classes will increase to 32 and the office will yield an 18.5% increase in the program. Additionally, the office staff is working closely with high schools to streamline due dates as well as increase the marketing visibility for the classes available to students. This current fall term the average class size for 27 sections yielded 25 students per class. The office aims at increasing the average class size to 35 students for the spring 2021 term. MC Staff is currently reviewing and updating CCAP and non-CCAP MOUs and will be meeting with high school principals to begin the conversation to move from standalone sections to cohort pathway models.

RAIDER CENTRAL

Since Raider Central began its Grab and Go on September 4th, 2020, we have provided the following food assistance to our students:

- 187 Students served
- 255 Bags of food distributed
- 174 Boxes of food distributed
- 334 Student family members assisted
- 66 Additional services requested through Raider Central such as financial aid and scholarship information, housing referrals, state/county social services resources, textbook lending program, and more.

We are excited to add a new team member, Britnee Sweat, to Raider Central. She is a recent MC graduate and currently enrolled at UCSB. She will be serving as provisional office assistant to support Raider Central.

Recently, Raider Central received \$50,000 from a foundation gift to address food and housing insecurities. Raider Central also received federal block grant funds to provide housing allowances to students. The staff is partnering with financial aid to disburse funds to needy students.

HOLIDAY CARE

Raider Central team is preparing to pass out Thanksgiving turkey boxes to students during the week of Thanksgiving as well as holiday boxes in December.

MC FOUNDATION: OUR RISING STARS

MC initiated the Rising Scholars Academy in 2019. It provides students in 7-12 grades from East Ventura County public schools a college-access program designed to give them and their families the encouragement, mentor-ship, rigorous academic exposure and social support that offer a pathway to a college degree at no cost. Students who complete the Rising Scholars program and choose to attend Moorpark College are eligible to receive scholarship funds and enrollment in the highly successful First Year Experience program.
