Course Content

Lecture/Course Content

- 20% Reinforce historically-informed performance practices and techniques of advanced western choral literature.
- 20% Introduce non-western vocal techniques and choral literature with an emphasis on authentic representation and performance.
- 20% Examine and discuss the cultural context and relevance of historical repertoire and how it aligns with contemporary culture.
- 20% Correct reading of articulation and expression markings.
- 20% Advanced score analysis and interpretation.

Laboratory or Activity Content

- 50% Advanced reading and performance of rhythms and pitches as notated.
- 30% Advanced vocal production and techniques specific to the genre or style of the choral literature.
- 20% Advanced musicianship development from sight singing to score analysis, with minimal aid from piano accompaniment.

Instructor will use a variety of small group and large group activities to ensure advanced skill development. Examples may include brief lectures or demonstrations of a new advanced vocal technique concept followed by student skill demonstrations or practice. Instructor may also lecture on western or non-western advance performance practices where students may then attempt to apply the concepts direct to the repertoire being studied in class.
