Course Content

Lecture/Course Content

20% - Advanced and expanded contemporary vocal technique, to include: vocal jazz technique, acappella technique, microphone technique, improvisation, vocal percussion, and stylization specific to each contemporary vocal genre. Additional techniques introduced such vocal expressions (e.g. shaking, microtonal bends, etc.).

- 15% Advanced historical and analytical review of the repertoire selected for performance or study.
- 20% Advanced study of rhythm, intonation, articulation, and expressive elements specific to each genre studied.
- 15% Professionalism with regard to attendance, rehearsal, performance practices, and participation.
- 20% Advanced analysis of the historical/cultural context of the literature/etude lists specific to the voice.
- 10% Memorization of selected repertoire for live performance, or in-class demonstrations as directed.

Laboratory or Activity Content

- 20% Advanced reading and performance of rhythms and pitches as notated.
- 20% Advanced improvisation of harmonic and melodic functions.
- 20% Advanced production and phonation of ensemble sound.
- 20% Advanced musicianship and individual preparation of performance literature whether notated or improvised.
- 20% Advanced sound technique concepts with microphones, mixing, gain, and filters.

Instructor will use a variety of small group and large group activities to ensure advanced skill development. Examples may include brief lectures or demonstrations of a new advanced vocal technique concept followed by student skill demonstrations or practice. Students may also demonstrate skill development independently, particularly regarding microphone/sound techniques and improvisation techniques.
