35% - Vocal technique: correct posture, breathing techniques, voice placement, and resonance

- 10% Character analysis, text translation, and character portrayal
- 25% Bridging registers between singing tessitura and range extension
- 10% Audition techniques and procedures
- 20% Diction and International Phonetic Alphabet (IPA) for songs in English, Italian, German, Spanish, French, and Latin.

Laboratory or Activity Content

- 30% Study and performance of song, opera, and oratorio literature
- 20% Development and practice of range extension and bridging registers
- 10% Study and performance of audition techniques and procedures
- 20% Study, analysis, and performance of texts within classical vocal works and translation of foreign language songs into English
- 20% Study and analysis of ensemble literature and performance
