Examples may include brief lectures or demonstrations of a new musical technique for wind or percussion instruments followed by student skill demonstrations or practice. Students may also demonstrate skill development independently, particularly regarding intonation and musicality. At instructor discretion, guest speakers may be invited to introduce or reinforce advanced wind ensemble concepts.
