- 2. examine published case studies such as KFC/Taco Bell, Sun Micro Systems, Symantec, Facebook, or Chrysler and analyze how theories of small group communication are evident in the case studies.

- 1. visit and analyze an existing, functioning group and explain how theories of small group communication can explain how the group functions.

As a result of the research, the group will plan and carry out a significant service project that will address the problem and will be of value to the college or community. In addition to a paper, the group will make a 30 minute presentation to the class explaining how the theories of small group communication applied to their group process. Each member will be responsible for speaking a minimum of five- minutes.
