- 6 identify and respond sensitively to unifying themes and literary devices between genres through the compilation of a multi-genre program with a central thematic argument.
- 7 develop a compiled script for a performance group which: a. Uses selections of each of the major genres of literature. b. Uses literature to develop an argument. c. Requires all performers to play a variety of roles. d. Contains all necessary elements of structure.
- 8 develop full-fledged characterizations that bring to light a literary persona's physical, vocal, psychological, etc., mannerisms within a group.
- 9 perform multiple characters within the framework of a group performance of a compiled script.
- 10 design set pieces that can be used with multiple functions.
- 11 block a compiled Readers Theatre script using organic and symbolic blocking.
