REMOTE WORK & THE FUTURE OF TEACHING/LEARNING/HIGHER ED

MC continues to adjust to the realities of life during a pandemic and reflect upon the future of work on campus and in our District. Moorpark College has developed 4 Remote Workgroups: Monica Garcia is convening the Policies subgroup; Carol Higashida, the Best Practices subgroup; Howard Davis, Operations subgroup; and Robert Cabral, Areas and Jobs subgroup.

Danielle Kaprelian and the librarians have been collecting resources on remote work and research on the future of work. They are curating a digital hub where articles, podcasts, books, policies, and other material on remote work that can accessed and to support the deliberations of the remote workgroups. I appreciate the time and effort that faculty, staff, and managers have invested in exploring how we create work environments that enable us to serve our students more efficiently utilizing multiple modes of interaction and to offer employees flexible work options that foster a balanced life while maintaining productivity.



Linda Resendiz (Classified Professional) Jodi Dickey (Counseling Faculty) Monica Garcia (Academic Manager) and Dan Mc Michael (Classified Supervisor) are representing Moorpark College on the VCCCD Remote Work Workgroup. Vice Chancellor Laura Barroso and Dr Sokenu are co-chairing with Associate Vice Chancellor Dan Watkins serving as the technology lead. The district group will meet for the first time in November to review recommendations on remote work from the three campuses and the District Administrative Center staff. The district wide group will sort the recommendations into those to be addressed in the short term and long term. The group will present Chancellor Gillespie with a report of short-term recommendations in December 2021. Spring 2022, the group will discuss policies and policy implications of remote and alternative work assignments, review job classifications that can be designated as remote, partially remote, or traditional. Late spring, the VCCCD Remote Workgroup will present recommendations for the long term to Chancellor Gillespie.

Community generosity and dedication to championing our mission of providing access to higher education in the last year provided support for student Basic Needs with more than \$60,000 to support students and expand the Raider Central essential needs center, over \$182,000 in scholarships awarded to a wide range of students — from a fund to help single mothers afford tuition to others focusing on professions like healthcare, engineering, technology, the arts, and leadership skills, support for the Rising Scholars Academy with \$12,000



in funding for mentorship, social support and rigorous academic exposure for students in middle school through high school to provide a pathway to a college degree at no cost.

FIRST YEAR/SECOND YEAR/CHESS STUDENTS

FYE has been keeping busy by providing the new cohort of students with coaching and counseling appointments and prepping for priority registration. Success Coaches will be providing students with workshops focused on physical and mental health to keep them motivated to get through the rest of the semester. FYE Counselors are working on getting students comprehensive education plans to align with our guided pathways work.

CHESS students are gearing up for transfer and are attending weekly group meetings with their success coach to work on their personal insight questions (PIQ) to prepare for UC applications. In addition, all CHESS students who participate in the Career Launch Internship Program will receive \$1,000 after completing the program.

GLOBAL STUDENTS

MC International is currently working with about 15 students for Spring 2022. MCI is also preparing to attend the virtual ICEF Berlin this year, as well as working on drafting a pathway program with catholic schools in Ventura County. Another focus is to bring more international athletes to Moorpark College.







RISING SCHOLARS

On Tuesday, October 26th we held a Rising Scholar Parent/Guardian Information Night in both Spanish and English for our Rising Scholars' parents and guardians. We discussed the Rising Scholars program and gave them an idea of what events would be held during the 2021-2022 school year. Our tutor, former Moorpark College student, Sofia Ingersoll, told her experience of being a student at Moorpark College and transferring to UC, San Diego in Chemistry as well as her experience with tutoring middle and high school students in math, English, and Sciences. Our adjunct counselor, Nancy Canela, interpreted the event in Spanish. She also told her heartfelt story about immigrating to the United States. Seven new Rising Scholars' parents and one guardian attended the event. Parents and guardian were encouraged to ask questions.







MC/OUT ALLY & SPECTRUM CLUB

Staff advisors and student participants are reviving the Moorpark College Spectrum Club, whose goal is to foster a safe space for LGBTQIA+ and Ally Students at Moorpark College. The Advisors and Board held a special Meet and Greet Halloween Celebration on October 26. Snacks, pizza and drinks were provided, and people also brought favorite board games. Participants came dressed up in their spookiest, coolest Halloween costumes and won prizes in a costume contest. A New website is currently underway with details to follow in the November 2021 update.

RAIDER CENTRAL

Raider Central has provided food, hygiene products, mental health services and housing referrals to over 250 students in the month of October. The efforts contribute the collaboration of connecting with the athletics, EATM and nursing departments, Raider Central staff is preparing to offer Thanksgiving boxes that will include turkey and sides during the week of November 22nd.

DI GRADUATION/TRANSFER PROJECT

Two counseling faculty have intentionally targeted over 5,500 disproportionately impacted students who have completed at least 45 units. The students are helped with the UC/CSU application, information on the transfer process, and submission of graduation applications.

DI PILOT PAID INTERNSHIP

The Career Launch program is a 100% remote internship designed for students who will participate in a 4-week self-paced course. Students will learn how to build relationships and valuable communication skills with employers, explore careers and occupations, and learn how to land an internship in today's world of work. CLASS IN THE HIGH SIERRAS

Roger Putnam teaches Mineralogy as a capstone class that MC geology majors take before they transfer. In this class, they apply the skills they have learned in their introductory geology and chemistry classes to understand how the chemistry of the geosphere (rocky part of the earth) influences how it is formed, subsequently modified, and consequently interacts with the biosphere, atmosphere, and hydrosphere.

On a trip to the eastern Sierra, our majors explored a variety of volcanic deposits to contrast how mineral chemistry affects volcanic behavior and natural hazards. This was done at Fossil Falls and the Owens River Gorge. They also explored where the granitic magma that later became the rock of the Sierra Nevada contacts the rock into which it intruded at the Alabama Hills and Pine Creek Canyon. This helped them understand how granitic magma (the magma that makes the continental crust) forms and evolves.

Professor Putnam reflects, "Many of these students only knew each other from Zoom classes during the pandemic. Despite working together in a face-to-face lecture/lab environment this semester, watched friendships blossom and community be built on this trip. It warmed my heart!"
