Writing Assignments

Keep a written reflective journal on a self-portrait project, examining conceptual and visual ideas expressed in a multi-panel painting. Write museum or gallery reports.

Write a research paper on an influential artist.

Critical Thinking Assignments

Design a series of abstractions to create a multi-panel painting.

Create a self-portrait that represents you visually, while also utilizing place, symbols, painting techniques, emotional and/or narrative elements to tell the viewer more about who you are.

Compare and contrast own artwork with another student work.

Reading Assignments

Read an artist feature from selected art magazines like *ArtNews, Art in America, Artillery, Juxtapoz*, etc. Read excerpt from textbook regarding advanced acrylic painting concepts. For example, Chapter 10 "Narrative Painting" from <u>Painting as a Language</u> by Jean Robertson and Craig McDaniel.

Skills Demonstrations

Replicate a complex preparatory drawing for a narrative painting. Utilize acrylic painting techniques to create a realistic self-portrait.
