Selected assigned readings, such as Chapter 6, "The Self-Portrait" from Painting Portraits by Anthony Connolly. Research the life and work of two contemporary watercolor artists in preparation for a compare/contrast essay.

## Skills Demonstrations

Create flesh tones charts by mixing a range of hues together to create realistic flesh tones for a diverse range of skin types.
Break down complex subject matter like glass or metal to learn to paint it in a realistic way.
Combine ink and watercolor together in a way that adds detail and complements the overall watercolor painting.

Research photographic images that demonstrate a variety of textures to be replicated in watercolor paint.
