Catalog Course Description

Studies general art concepts including the major principles and techniques used to create visual art objects in diverse media. Assists students in developing informed perceptions and evaluations of works of art and understanding of the diverse historical, cultural, and theoretical contexts across the world and across time. Examines art theory, terminology, themes, design principles, and other components of visual and performing arts. Honors work challenges students to be more analytical and creative through expanded assignments, real-world applications, and enrichment opportunities.

Course Credit Limitations: Credit will not be awarded for both the honors and regular versions of a course. Credit will be awarded only for the first course completed with a grade of "C" or better or "P". Moorpark College Honors Program requires a letter grade.

- written analysis of the elements of art and principles of composition present in an artwork.
- written evaluation of assigned homework topic or outside reading (i.e. "minority" artist or non-western art report)
- written visual and contextual analysis and understanding of an art object seen during a museum or gallery visit (live or virtual).
- compare and contrast essay with detailed visual and contextual analysis of works of art.
- written analysis about a controversial artist to reveal through research the life events and/or experiences that informed their work. (Honors)

Critical Thinking Assignments

- apply critical thinking to determine which main art style an artist is using in their work
- understand and interpret paintings, sculptures, architecture, performance art or artistic crafts by recognizing and analyzing formal composition and figurative devices used by the artist, such as symbolism and iconography.
- discuss, analyze and critique the cultural and historical variations in artistic representation through time and space in the classroom setting, taking into account contextual information.
- analyze the content of artworks in class discussions, homework assignments, and formal essays using evaluation of formal elements and principles of design.

- present individual or group research centered on the social, religious or political content of art. This may occur as oral or written classwork, homework, or questions on exams.
- develop formal and critical analyses of artworks in context or in comparison with other works of similar or different periods or cultures (compare/contrast exercises). This may occur in class discussions, written homework, or questions on exams.
- present individual or group research centered on the social, religious or political content of art. This may occur as oral or written classwork, homework, or questions on exams. (Honors)
