Instructor will guide students through various puppet fabrication techniques from but not limited to techniques used in diverse cultures, including but not limited to foam construction, two-dimensional shadow puppets, mold making and paper mache. Instructor will guide students in class discussions with diverse experts in the field of puppetry through in-class visits, field trips to performances and professional workshops with a strong puppet component, as well as performances on video.

read *On the Marionette Theatre* by Heinrich von Kleist which will give the students an understanding of the basic principles of marionette design and performance.

read each other's scripts composed specifically for the class and puppetry.
