Director's Note:

Ten years ago, I pitched making Shakespeare a part of the regular rotation of plays on the main stage. Since that time, Suzanne Fagan and I, along with our faculty collaborators Haleh Risdana, Brian Koehler, Moira MacDonald, Ariana Burrell, Melissa Lay, Nancy Ferraro-Paradis and Sydney Sims have had the great pleasure of bringing Shakespeare's work to our students and the community. This semester we welcome Nathan Bowen, Department Chair and Music Faculty, who brings us Bradley Aukerman, our Composer. ALL of the music that you will enjoy today was created by a Moorpark College student with the dedicated aid of fellow-student, Casey O'Brien. We are proud to offer an opportunity for extended artistic collaboration to our students and thankful for an Administration that provides the means to make this all happen!

The Tempest has enjoyed a lush history of lavish productions. Of late, it has gained notoriety for being on the banned book list in Arizona for its themes of colonialism and appropriation. I suspect that Shakespeare would take great pride in knowing that his works still strikes fear in the hearts of those too ashamed or timid to face their own reflection in his still relevant and necessary work.

Today, I find myself connecting to Prospero. The older statesman struggling with his past and a man that has had the blissful gift of a fully realized life with his adoring child on a magical island. At a moment in the play when the Goddesses that have completed their blessing of the union of his daughter to Ferdinand, Prospero, in his classic speech says "Our revels now are ended." It's easy to understand Prospero's observation of their revels ending in this context. Yet, as a student of Shakespeare and as a father who has given a daughter's hand away at the altar, I know that Prospero is also saying goodbye to the child he has loved, raised and reveled in. And he is acknowledging that those wondrous memories of her childhood are forever changed as their past selves are now no more than ethereal spirits, locked in time, roaming together through cloudcapped towers and gorgeous palaces. An insubstantial dream that has now faded.



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

Scenic Design @ Moorpark College



 ${f U}$ his production of The Tempest marks the 10-year anniversary of the Shakespearean-style set that was designed and created for the production of Henry IV Parts I & II in 2013. The base design of this Shakespearean set takes inspiration from the Globe Theatre as well as a traditional

Shakespearean Thrust Stage (which is a style of stage many Shakespeare companies utilize). Both styles of stage, while very prominent structurally, are usually very minimal with show-specific elements, and largely rely on the dialog of the production to delineate space and detail. When Shakespeare originally produced his works on the Globe stage, it was quite literally a bare stage, a back wall with a couple entrances, and two large pillars. Additional scenery was minimal, and they would only bring on pieces that were simple, such as a couple of chairs or a small table, or those that were absolutely necessary. So, this style of stage becomes a classic theatrical component in and of itself, and provides that type of production experience for our students. To just use the base facade, as many theatres that utilize this style of set do, would not allow for the production project work our scenic and tech classes produce each semester. So we absolutely embellish some here – and especially for *The Tempest* – but the core of it is still that traditional Shakespearean model, and all design decisions start from there. Even with something as magical as *The Tempest*, it is about embracing the traditional structure versus hiding it - which can make for some wonderful problem-solving!

I am amazed that this set continues to persevere from season to season. These boards have seen some things over the years, not having ideal storage it has been partially exposed to the elements and, almost certainly, has been inhabited by raccoons! Yet here it stands. Sure, it's needed some TLC over

the years, but it keeps coming back together. As always, I look forward to the next time we get to use it; and look for ways to upgrade its core as we look to the next 10 years of classical theatre production at Moorpark College.

Dramaturg's Note



The Tempest starts like a tragedy, with betrayal, revenge, and a flaming shipwreck. But it grows into a story of young love and second chances. Prospero, who is not only an Italian duke but a master magician, has only a few brief hours to right old wrongs, arrange his daughter's happiness, and

bring order to the island where he lives with its magical inhabitants.

In 2023 we're very aware that Prospero is an entitled nobleman and a severe master to the creatures he has pressed into his service. Like a true colonialist, he assumes that his are the only true morals, that his language is the only real language. To its original audiences these qualities would have seemed natural, even praiseworthy: it is the father's duty to instruct, the Duke's duty to govern. And yet each character speaks in its own eloquent voice: Caliban (the name is an anagram of "Cannibal"), who is "half fish and half monster," delights in the beauties of the island, and the airy spirit Ariel desires nothing more than freedom. As always, Shakespeare is more complex than he first seems.

Where is the real magic in this play? Is it in the book of spells and the magician's staff and cloak? In the musical sprites who inhabit the island? In Prospero's embrace of his full mere humanity? Or is it in Shakespeare's poetry? Or yet—is it in us, the audience, who ultimately decide the fate of the whole play?

I hope you are enchanted!
